DID YOU KNOW?

In the United States, 300 - 400 million electronic items become obsolete each year, but less than 20 percent of it is recycled.



Recycling raw materials from end-of-life electronics is an effective solution to the growing E-waste problem. Recycling electronics reduces energy and resource demands associated with the mining and manufacturing of virgin material, conserving our natural resources for future generations.

Most electronic devices contain a variety of materials, including metals that can be recovered for future uses. On average, one metric ton of circuit boards can contain 40 to 800 times more gold and 30 to 40 times more copper as compared to one metric ton of virgin ore mined in the U.S.

Tehama County businesses and residents can easily recycle their electronics free of charge at the Tehama County/Red Bluff Landfill during normal operating hours or the last Saturday of each month from 8:00AM-12:00PM at the Tehama County Department of Social Services parking lot on Main Street in Red Bluff or the Corning Park-n-Ride at the corner of 3rd and Solano Streets in Corning.

BEVERAGE CONTAINER RECYCLING... DONE RIGHT

No matter how you recycle, the County thanks you for your efforts. Here's a tip to maximize your recycling efforts the next time you finish a refreshing, cold beverage:

- Take your aluminum, glass and plastic beverage containers to your local recycling center for a **cash refund** (5 ¢ for containers less than 24 oz. and 10 ¢ for containers 24 oz. or larger).
- Toss your rinsed beverage containers into your **blue curbside**

recycling cart with your other recyclables.
