DID YOU KNOW?

The beauty of fall brings with it the reality of having to deal with the debris left behind from our favorite shade providing friends. The question then becomes, “**What should I do with all of these leaves?**” Here are a few tips to help you deal with this annual chore:

Mulch them!

Leaves, when left to decay in the street, will release phosphorous, which can find its way into storm drains and waterways—better to shred them finely with a **mulching mower** and let them fertilize the lawn. Or rake choppings under shrubs and onto flower and vegetable beds as mulch.

Compost them!

Decaying leaves also generate carbon, which helps turn food scraps into “**black gold**”—good for gardening. In a mixed pile, keep the ratio of dead leaves to grass clippings at about 2-to-1. Spread the leaves on top so they can soak up the moisture in food scraps and help keep a lid on odors; turn over regularly to discourage pests. **Or just compost the leaves alone in a pile to make a nutrient rich leaf mold to add to your garden.**
