Did you know...

Recycling one million laptops saves the energy equivalent to the electricity used by 3,657 homes in a year.

The EPA estimates that textile waste accounted for 16.9 million tons in 2017, while only 2.6 million tons were recycled.

Over 78% of school waste could be kept out of the landfill through composting and recycling.

Lunchtime trash is second only to office paper as the leading source of school waste.
