This year's crop report is dedicated to the memory of Dave Eder. Dave worked for the Tehama County Department of Agriculture as an Agricultural / Weights & Measures Aide from April 2001 until his untimely death in 2009. He was responsible for the Glassy Winged Sharp Shooter (GWSS) trapping routes and methodically inspected nursery shipments, ensuring that the pest never had a chance to make Tehama County home.

In addition to the GWSS program, Dave assisted with the county road herbicide program and regularly displayed his craftsmanship by building such items as cabinets for the office.

Dave loved a rousing discussion over politics and football, especially his beloved Raiders. His family was his priority and enjoyed camping trips with his wife, children and grandchildren.

Dave's passing on December 5, 2009 saddened all that had the pleasure of knowing him. His contributions to the Department will always be appreciated and he will be greatly missed.

pleased to submit the 2009 Agricultural Crop Report. As required by Section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code, this annual report provides a statistical description of Tehama County's agricultural production. All figures in the report represent gross returns only and do not reflect net income of producers.

The total gross value of Tehama County agricultural production in 2009 was \$180,610,800, a 13.9% increase from 2008 values. The increase is attributed to increases in prices for several commodities.

Orchard crops lead the overall increase in value of \$30,924,700 from 2008. The increase can be significantly credited to walnuts as they posted a 78.1% increase in value attributed to increased acreage, production and prices. Unseasonable heat and winds in May resulted in further production losses for olives, resulting in an additional decrease in value. Wine grapes rebounded from last year's freeze damage, posting a 303.6% increase in value.

Field crops decreased 37.7% in value, with alfalfa hay contributing a 52.8% decrease. Livestock values increased 9.1% due to increases in inventory and prices. Market milk values decreased 51.2% due largely to a 39.8% price decrease and slight production decreases.

My sincere appreciation goes out to the growers, processors, government agencies, and others that provided information used in compiling this report, their cooperation is invaluable. I wish to thank all staff that assisted in compiling this report with special recognition to Marcie Skelton for the report's production, as this publication would not be possible without their combined efforts.





In accordance with Section 2272 of the California Food and Agriculture Code, this Crop Report includes a brief account of those efforts, which are being made to exclude or eradicate exotic pests; and to best manage those which already exist, in a manner most conducive to the protection of our environment. Three 'A' rated noxious weeds, of limited distribution were under eradication. The 'A' rated plants include Skeleton Weed, Dalmatian Toad-flax, and Spotted Knapweed. Tehama County continues to manage sites of 'B' and 'C' rated weeds in areas of limited distribution.



Skeleton WeedDalmatian Toad-FlaxSpotted KnapweedDuring2009, 55 high-risk ship-ments were inspected for compliancewith quarantine requirements, 1 of the shipments was rejected.During the year, 1,857 various ship-ments were certified for export to 55 countries around the world.Spotted Knapweed

Pest detection trapping for Mediterranean Fruit Fly, Oriental Fruit Fly, Melon Fly, Japanese Beetle, and Gypsy Moth consisted of 352 traps being deployed, resulting in no finds. One hundred fifty four Glassy Winged Sharpshooter traps were placed in Tehama County. One hundred seventy-two incoming nursery shipments from counties with Glassy Winged Sharpshooter and/or Light Brown Apple Moth were conducted, resulting in no finds. Tehama County continues to actively monitor for the Light Brown Apple Moth; in 2009 there were 70 traps deployed throughout the county with emphasis on nurseries and fields destined for the global market.


There were 31 registered organic growers in Tehama County in 2009, totaling 12,547 acres of registered organic land. These growers range from small gardens catering to local Certified Farmer's Markets to large-scale livestock, dairy, orchard and field crop producers.




